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
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

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

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PREAMBLE

The Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies, Sarnath, set up in 1967, was still at an initial stage, without even the minimum infrastructure, when Prof. S. Rinpoche joined as Principal in 1971. Fifteen years of tireless effort by Prof. Rinpoche, with the blessing of The H.H. the Dalai Lama and the consistent support of the concerned authorities, particularly of Dr. (Mrs.) Kapila Vatsyayan, and of the Department of Culture, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India, brought CIHTS to its present shape and helped it obtain the "Deemed to be University" status in 1988.

His life-long selfless dedication and service for the preservation and dissemination of Tibet's rich cultural heritage will be recognised and remembered by the generations to come. Prof. S. Rinpoche is the personification of the experience, vision and wisdom that have concretised the idealism of the late Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru and the vision of His Holiness the Dalai Lama through institutional framework of the Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies (CIHTS). As admitted by himself and many others, it has not been an easy task. Despite the heavy responsibilities and engagements, he has continued to be a teacher. The Shantarakshita Library of CIHTS holds over 300 audio-cassettes of his teachings and lectures given mostly to the students. These teachings and lectures cover mainly the subject of Buddhism, Education, Tibetan studies and current Tibetan political issues.



Dr. (Mrs.) Kapila Vatsyayan, who has had twenty-five years of association with Rinpoche has correctly remarked, "Prof. S. Rinpoche had often bemoaned the lack of time for his own scholarship. However, what has been his personal loss has been the gain of a generation of young scholars from many parts of the world".

Prof. G.C. Pandey, an eminent scholar who had a longstanding association with Rinpoche remarked, "the whole campus of CIHTS has been growing and functioning for over two decades as a centre of higher education and research in Tibetan learning and Buddhism. Its renown has spread far and wide and its products are welcome all over the world. This singular institute, which has made its mark internationally in the world of scholarship may be said to be the creation of Prof. S. Rinpoche. At the same time he is an administrator of proven ability and now in the wider sphere of governance and politics he has made a mark for himself as statesman and diplomat. He carries the message of Tibet and Buddhism to the face corners of the world".

Professor Emeritus, late Geshe Lhundup Sopa, University of Wisconsin has precisely stated, "The Institute's numerous publications in Tibetan, Sanskrit, Hindi and English are indispensable to scholars working on the Indo-Tibetan Buddhist Culture—they are concrete evidence of Rinpoche's remarkable labors".

The sole aim of organising the Felicitation ceremony on his 75th Birthday by the alumni is to express our heartfelt respect and gratitude to Prof. S. Rinpoche for this tireless contribution to the growth of CIHTS, and to the preservation, promotion and dissemination of Tibetan and Indian culture and knowledge. We wish him very HAPPY BIRTHDAY. We wish for his healthy and long life.



Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, the first Prime Minister of India and His Holiness the Dalai Lama discussed to establish Central University of Tibetan Studies, (Originally called Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies) to educate the young Tibetan diaspora and the Himalayan border region of India who have religion, culture and language in common with Tibet.

Central University of Tibetan Studies, Sarnath, Varanasi

Concept and Objectives

The Central University of Tibetan Studies, then called Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies, envisioned as a result of discussion between His Holiness the Dalai Lama and the then Prime Minister of India Pandit Jawaharlala Nehru, was established in 1967 with the view to educate the youths of Tibet and Himalayan border students of India. A more important reason for the establishment of this university was to resuscitate the past glory which lies ensconced in the precious Buddhist scriptures on religion and philosophy, art and architecture and science and technologies- including astronomy and medicine, a substantial volume of which is preserved by the Tibetan exiles despite their sudden and terrific calamity.

Persons endowed with imagination, particularly in the Government of India, have carefully thought out the objectives of the institute. The objectives are:

- 1. To preserve the Tibetan culture and traditions;
- 2. To preserve ancient Indian Sciences and literature preserved in the Tibetan language, but lost in the original;
- 3. To offer an alternative educational facility to the students of Indian border areas who formerly availed the opportunity of receiving higher education in Tibet; and
- 4. To accomplish gains of teaching and scope of research in traditional subjects in a framework of modern University system of education with the provision for award of degrees in Tibetan studies.

Brief History

The Institute initially functioned as a special constituent wing of the Sampurnananda Sanskrit University. The Chandramani Review Committee in 1970 and the D.P. Yadava Committee in 1975 reviewed the work of the Institute. In view of the pragmatic sanction and desirability of its avowed growth, the Review Committee recommended that the Institute may be given an independent status and be shifted to Sarnath. Accordingly, the Institute was registered under the Societies Registration Act in the end of 1977 to operate as an autonomous organization under the Department of Culture, Government of Indi with financial support from the Government. Since then the Institute has steadily progressed with optimal success.

On 28th January, the auspicious occasion of the foundation day was gracefully celebrated in a style, which befitted traditional Tibetan ceremony and was attended by about thousand scholars including Dr. (Mrs.) Kapila Vatasyayan, the then Joint Educational Adviser and Chairperson of the Institute. Dr. (Mrs.) Kapila Vatasyayan conveyed messages received on the occasion from the President of India Neelam Sanjiva Reddy, Prime Minister, Smt. Indira Gandhi, Union Educational Minister Shri. B. Shankarananda and the Governor of Uttar Pradesh Dr. G.D. Tapse.

The foundation of the Institute's building complex of the new campus was laid down by His Holiness the Dalai Lama on 28th January, 1980 at Sarnath on the purchased land, a lime stone of achievement for providing sacred vicinity to reprieve a traditional society from effacement, as there have been times in the past when Buddhist scholarship and artistic genres had reached distant places like Ta-Zig or Tajikistan in west along with other important points as Gilgit (Grusha), Khotan and Kashmir and the Tun-huang region in the north of Tibet in Chinese Turkestan, which had once been under Tibetan occupation. Likely on the Himalayan borders, Ladakh, Lahual-Spiti, Nepal, Sikkim, Bhutan and Arunachal Pradesh invariably drew on an Indo-Tibetan Buddhist tradition, philosophy and Science.

This tradition shared by the above regions meticulously conserved and reoriented on ethonogenetic and other scientific principles will, it was hoped, greatly add to the enrichment of the Cultural ensemble in India and in all parts of the world where Tibetology was not a taboo. The philosophy of Mahayana conjures up vision of the past, wherein, the wisdom of the Buddha permeated men's lives and inspired striking images in the thoughts, as of Nagarjuna and Maitreyanatha, Aryadeva and Ashvagosha, Asanga and Vasubandhu, Dignaga and Dharmakirti in India and Milarepa and Kunga Gvaltsen. Longchen Rabiampa and Tsongkhapa in Tibet.

In adherence to a long-standing demand the CPWD completed the construction of the hostel-block and the administrative block, which it handed over to the Institute in the months of January and August of the year 1982. The Institute shifted to the new campus on the 15th August 1982.

The Hon'be Prime Minister Smt. Indira Gandhi visited the Institute on the 8th April 1983. She was accompanied by the Chief Minister of Uttar Pradesh Sri. Sripati Mishra and the Union Education Minister, Smt. Sheela Kaul besides Institute Chairperson Dr. (Mrs.) Kapila Vatsyayana and other higher dignitaries.

Smt. Gandhi planted the sapling of a "Sal" tree in the Institute's foreground, significantly reminiscing two great episodes in the Buddha's life. She also released two publications of the Institute viz. the Dhammapada and the Nyaya Pravesa of Dignaga.

In June 1984, the Library originally accommodated in rented rooms of the Tibetan Monastery was shifted to a newly constructed Library block the Shantarakshita Library in the main premise of the Institute.

After considerable growth of its infrastructure and academic excellence, the Department of Culture initiated a proposal for this Institute during 1983-84 to obtain the Deemed to be University status at the University Grants Commission and Central Govt. levels. Finally, the Institute was declared as a "Deemed to be University" on 5th April 1988.

To comprehend the special feature and basic approach to academic programme of the Institute, the nature and magnitude of Tibetan studies have to be borne in mind, the courses are imparted in Semester System through the following five Faculties:

- 1. Faculty of Hetu Evam Adyatma Vidya (Logic and Spirituality)
- 2. Faculty of Shabda Vidya (Language and Literature)
- 3. Faculty of Chikitsa Vidya (Sowarigpa Medical Science)
- 4. Faculty of Shilpa Vidya (Arts and Crafts) and
- 5. Faculty of Adhunik Vidya (Modern Studies)

The Faculty of Hetu and Adhyatma Vidya consist of four departments:

- 1. Department of Mool Shastra (Indian Buddhist Philosophy)
- 2. Department of Sampradaya Shastra (Tibetan Buddhist Philosophy)

The Faculty of Shabda Vidya

- 1. Department of Tibetan Language and Literature
- 2. Department of Sanskrit
- 3. Department of Hindi
- 4. Department of English
- 5. Department of Pali

The Faculty of Chikista Vidya consists of one department

1. Department of Bhot Ayurveda (Sowarigpa)

The Faculty of Shilpa Vidya consist two departments

- 1. Departmen of Bhot Jyotish
- 2. Department of Bhota Kala and Shilpa

The Faculty of Adhunika Vidya consists of one department

3. Department of Samajik Vijnana (Social Sciences) consisting of (a) Ancient Indian History, (b) Tibetan History, (c) Economic, (d) Political Science

Course of Study

Teaching at graduate and postgraduate levels alone does not suffice to educate the youths in such a vast domain. Therefore, a four years course at the pre-university level was found indispensable. An integrated course of nine years duration right from Class IX standard to the post graduate level was, therefore, prepared in the following order.

Research

In order to build the human resource to meet the objective of the Institute, Rigorous Training Course of Tibetan-Sanskrit Language and restoration was started in 1980. Eventually, three batches of research scholars were engaged in restoration and translation of important texts from Tibetan into Sanskrit and other languages. To carry out this important task more effectively, the Department of Restoration and Translation were formally setup. Eventually, Rare Buddhist Text Research Department and Dictionary Department added to strengthen the research endeavors of the University. A number of Buddhist texts lost in original Sanskrit were restored into its original form with help of its Tibetan version and translated into other languages. A number of Rare Buddhist Texts are critically edited and published. A comprehensive Sanskrit-Tibetan Dictionary of 16 volumes has been complied and published. More than 160 titles were published in the form of restoration, translation and critical edition by various research departments of the university under eight various series. Biannual research Journal Dhih is regularly published since 1986.

The Institute's general role in promoting the academic atmosphere in this country and its contribution to the fields of Tibetology and Buddhology has now become well known to the world of scholars.

The Institute also organizes local, national and international seminars, symposia and workshops to discuss various subjects pertaining to several disciplines, opening new dimensions for reorienting many archaic conceptions.

Exchange Programme

The Institute is having Educational Exchange Program with Colleges and Universities in USA and Tasmania University, Australia and Digital University, South Korea. Under the program, a group of students from foreign universities visit the Institute for a short-term course in Buddhist Philosophy and Tibetan History and Culture. In exchange, students of the institute are being sent to Hampshire and Tasmania for further studies. The faculties of the institute visit other institutions as visiting professor to teach Buddhist philosophy. Tibetan language and literature.

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





His Eminence the 100th Gaden Tripa, most venerable Lobsang Nima Rinpoche joined the Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies, Sarnath in year 1967 and received his Archarya Degree (Equivalent to M.A.) in 1972. He received the Geshe Lharampa degree. In 1974, His Holiness the Dalai Lama appointed him as the abbot of Gyudmed Tantric Monastic College. In 1976 he was appointed as the Abbot of Namgyal Monastery (His Holiness's Private Monastery). In 1983, he ascended to the Throne of Jangtse Choeje (The immediate post to Gaden Tripa). In 1994, he deservingly ascended to the Golden Throne of rJe Tsongkhapa the founder of the Gelugpa school of Tibetan Buddhism as the 100th Throne holder. In 2001, he was conferred the Honorary degree of Vakapati by the Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies, Sarnath, Varanasi in recognition of his wisdom and contribution to the society.

Sharpa Choeje Khensur Lobsang Nyima joined the Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies in 1967 and received Acharya degree in 1969. In 1971 he obtained the Geshe Lharampa degree and joined Gyuto Tantric College. In 1973 he joined the CIHTS to pursue his Ph.D. degree on Two Truths. In 1979 His Holiness the Dalai Lama appointed him as the Abbot of Gyuto Tantric College. In 1990, His Holiness the Dalai Lama appointed him the Abbot of the Gaden Shartse Monastic University. During his tenure in both the Monastic Institutions, he gave teachings in Buddhist philosophy and Tantra to a number of students until his demise in 1995.





Khensur Geshe Jampa Thechog joined the Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies in 1967 and received Acharya Degree in 1970. He was appointed Lecturer in Gelug Sampradaya of CIHTS. In 1980 on the invitation of Foundation for the Preservation of Mahayana Tradition (FPMT) he joined Manjusri institute in London as resident teacher. After that he was the resident teacher at several FPMT centers including Instituto Lama Tsongkhap in Italy, Land of Medicine Buddha in California and Nalanda Monastery in France. In 1993 His Holiness the Dalai Lama appointed him as abbot of Sera Jey Monastic University in South India. Khensur Rinpoche has authored several books including "Insight into Emptiness" published from Wisdom Publications.

Achok Rinpcohe joined the Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies, Sarnath in 1968 and received Acharya degree in 1971. After completing this study at the institute he became the abbot of Tashikhyil Monastery in Dehradun. From 1988-1989 he served as the director of Tibetan Medical Institute and Astrology in Dharamsala. In 1994 His Holiness the Dalia Lama appointed him as the abbot of Gaden Shartse Monastic University in South India. From 1998-2005 he served as the director of Library of Tibetan Works and Archives, Dharamsala, H.P.





Khensur Rinpoche Jampa Yeshe joined the CIHTS in 1968 and received his Acharya degree in 1971. In the same year he was conferred the Lharam Geshe degree (Ph.D equivalent) in the presence of H.H. the 14th Dalai Lama. In 1973 he joined CIHTS for Ph.D. on 'Valid Person' in Buddhist Epistemology. He was one of the first students of the university to pursue research in the modern educational framework. In 1984, His Holiness the Dalai Lama appointed him as the Abbot of the Gaden Shartse Monastic University.



Kensur Geshe Konchok Tsering joined the CIHTS in the year 1973. In 1980, Kensur Rinpoche received Geshe Larampa degree. He joined CIHTS to pursue Ph.D. on 'Mind in Buddhism'. In 1985 he joined the Gyuto Tantric College to study tantra. In 1989, he was appointed as one of the official teachers in Gaden Shartse Monastic University. In 1996, Kensur Rinpoche was appointed as the Abbot of Gaden Shartse. He continued to serve as abbot for 5 years.

Geshe Sonam Palsang joined the CIHTS in 1970 and received Shastri and Acharya degree. After graduation he returned to his parent institute the Gaden Monastic University, where he received Geshe degree. After that he joined Central Institute of Buddhist Studies, Leh, Ladakh and served as resident teacher of remote Wakha nunnery. His contribution for the uplifting the nunnery is praise worthy. Later he joined Gyotoe Tantric College and received his degree in Tantra. His Holiness the Dalai Lama appointed him as the abbot of Gyutoe Tantric College.





Khensur Geshe Lobsang Palden joined the Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies, Sarnath in 1967 and received Acharya Degree in 1978. After graduation, he became a teacher of Buddhist philosophy at Sera Monastic University. In 2000 His Holiness the Dalai Lama appointed him as the abbot of the Sera Je Monastic University in South India.

Khenpo Lodro Donyo Rinpoche, joined the CIHTS in 1968 and received Acharya degree in 1977. After graduation he returned to Sonada Monastery and continued his study and teaching. In Darjeeling monastery, he was conferred the Khenpo Rinpoche title and later assumed the responsibility of the Abbot of Bokar Ngedon Chokhor Ling Monastery, in Mirik, India. Khenpo Rinpoche is renowned as a scholar and author of many books. He visited through out the world to teach Buddhism and its practice.





Geshe Palden Dakpa joined CIHTS in the 1973 and received Acharya degree in 1975. In the same year he was conferred Geshe Lharampa Degree. From 1978 to 1988 he served at Tibet House, New Delhi as a Residence Professor and Researcher. In 1988 he spent three months in USA as a visiting professor at the University of Virginia. As per His Holiness the Dalai Lama's kind guidance and direction, he returned to Drepung Loseling Monastery to continue teaching Buddhist philosophy to thousands of aspirants from all around the globe. He has written three books on Vinaya and daily Buddhist practices.

Khenpo Tsewang Gyatso joined the Central Institute of Higher Tibetan studies at Sarnath in 1969. He received Acharya degree in 1978, served as a teacher in Palyul Namdroling Monastery at the Tibetan settlement in Bylakuppe, near Mysore in South India. For several years he was engaged in training the young monks and teaching in the monastic college, the Ngagyur Nyingma Institute (Shedra). In 1983 he was enthroned as a Khenpo. Khen Rinpoche has traveled and taught extensively in America, Taiwan, Singapore, Hong Kong, and the Philippines.





Gomang Kehnsur Lobsang Tenzin joined the CIHTS in 1970, and received Acharya degree in 1973. In 1982, he received the Geshe degree. In 1989, His Holiness the Dalai Lama appointed him as the Abbot of Drepung Gomang Monastic University. Khen Rinpoche has traveled to Russia, Mongolia and Europe to teach Buddhism. Khen Rinpoche also holds Drepung Tripa title during his tenure.

Khen Rinpoche Geshe Lobzang Tseten hails from Ladakh. He joined the CIHTS in 1970 and received Shastri Degree. From 1974-1978 Khen Rinpoche taught in the high school in Ladakh. In 1984 he received Geshe Degree from Drepung Monastic University. At present he is teaching and lecturing at a number of schools in USA including Smith, Bowdoin, Amherst, Hampshire, Drew, Maine College of Art, Bangor Theological Seminary, Phillips Exeter Academy, Deerfield Academy, and others. In 1995, Khen Rinpoche founded The Siddhartha School in his home village in Stok, Ladakh for the young and needy children of Ladakh. In 1996, shortly after he founded the school, H.H. the Dalai Lama, appointed as the abbot of the newly reestablished Tashi Lhunpo Monastery in India.





Khenpo Migmar Tsering joined the Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies, Sarnath, Varanasi in 1970. In 1972 he joined Sakya College in Dehradun where he obtained the degree of Lopon. After completing his study at Sakya College, he served at the Library of Tibetan Works and Archives as a translator for a short period. From 1983 to 1989 he taught at Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies as a Lecturer in Sakya Sampradaya. In 1989 he was appointed director of the Sakya College in Dehradun and enthroned as the Abbot of the college. His untimely demise is a great lose not only to the Sakya tradition, but also to the Tibetan Buddhism as a whole.

Ven. Tshultrim Phuntsok joined the CIHTS in 1971 and received his Acharya degree in 1981. After graduation he joined rigorous training course on Restoration of lost Buddhist texts from Tibetan to Sanskrit, and translation in Hindi and other languages. In 1987 he was appointed as Asst. Professor in Tibetan History at CUTS. In 2005 His Holiness the Dalai Lama appointed him as the Abbot of the Ratod Monastery in South India.





Khenpo Sonam Gyatso joined the CIHTS in 1971. In 1974 he joined Sakya College and studied the five major science of learning till 1984. From 1985 till 1989 he served as the abbot of the Thupten Namgyal Ling Institute, Puruwala. In 1994 he established Thupten Kunphel Choede Buddhist Centre in Taiwan. From 1999 till 2013 served as the Principal and abbot of Sakya College and was actively involved both in the administration and in teaching. In 2000, he established the Retreat Centre - Tsechen Shed-Dub Samten Phuntsok Ling, which was inaugurated by The His Holiness the Dalai Lama. In 2009, he established Sakya College for Nuns. At present he is serving as the Director of Sakya College for Nuns, Dehradun.

Khenpo Jigme Dorjee joined the CIHTS in 1968 and received Acharya degree in 1977. After graduation he served Druk Sa-ngak Choling Monastery from 1980-2013 as Khenpo.



Khenpo Ngawang Tenzin Gyatso joined the CIHTS in 1969 and received Acharya degree in 1978. After graduation he served in the Druk Thupten Sangak Choling. He is the general secretary of Druk Thupten Sangak Choling Monastery and the President of Manjushree Centre of Tibetan Culture, Darjeeling, W.B.



Khenpo Ngawang Woser attended the CIHTS and received Acharya degree. After graduation he moved to Nepal and served as the Chief Lama and the Principal of Samten Choeling Gonpa, Dolkha in Nepal. At present he is residing in New York, USA teaching Buddhism.





Acharya Nurbu Sherpa joined the CUTS in 1998. He received Acharya degree from S. Sanskrit University in 2006. Alumni in Buddhist Centres Around the World

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



H was the chanting-master (umdze) of the Ganden Jangtse College for five years from 1976, and head of the school for young monks. He visited Germany several times to give lectures at the Goethe Institute of the Frankfurt University. In 1992, Geshe la became the resident teacher of Maitreya Instituut in Emst. In 2001, Geshela founded Dhonden Foundation in order to help Tibetans in need.



Lama Migmar Tseten attended the Central Institute of Higher Tibetan Studies in 1970 and received his Acharya degree in 1979. In 1980 he was appointed the Director of the Sakya Centre and Sakya Institute in 1981. In 1989, he moved to USA as the resident teacher of the Sakya Chokhor Yangtse in Massachusetts, USA.

Geshe Lhabu Dhondup attended the CIHTS and received his Acharya degree. From 1981-2002 he taught at the Central Institute of Buddhist Studies, Leh, Ladakh. He continued his spiritual training and received his Geshe Lharam degree, from Drepung Loseling Monastery in 1989. Geshe la joined M. Phil. in Sampurnanada Sanskrit University and worked on the critical edition of first four chapters of Abhidharma Kosha. Geshe la has taught at Drepung Loseling Monastery, Atlanta, USA.





Geshe Ngawang Sherap joined the CIHTS and received Acharya degree. Later he joined Delhi University and earned the degree of M. Lib. Sc. From 1976 to 1979 he served CST, Shimla as its Rector. From 1981 to 1996 he served the Shantarakshita Library of CIHTS as the Librarian. He earned Geshe degree from Sera Mey Monastic University, South India. At present he travels to Europe, USA, Canada, Nepal, Bhutan, Mongolia and South Asian countries to teach Buddhist philosophy and practice.

Dr. Tashi Zangmo joined the CIHTS and obtained the Shastri degree. She joined Mt. Holyoke College under the exchange program with the University and received her second Bachalor's degree in 1999. She then earned her master's and Ph.D. degree in International Education from the University of Massachusetts in Amherst, USA in 2009. She then returned to Bhutan and started Bhutan Nun Foundation under the patronage of Her Majesty, the Queen Mother. The mission of the foundation is to provide learning opportunity to the nuns and to set up a Higher Buddhist Learning Center for the Bhutanese nuns.





Mr. Dawa Dhondup is a professional translator. He joined CIHTS and received Acharya degree. After graduation he worked in Kopan Monastery to train young monks in translation from Tibetan to English.
